

Welcome!

Our desire is this tool will be a launching point to see people activated to love their communities in greater measure. This Envisioning and Strategy Toolkit was originally created by our team in Asia, to use in closed countries to equip and empower leaders to collaborate and live on-mission in the cities in which they find themselves. The more we worked with this tool we realized what a great mobilizing piece it is, and we want to make it more widely available. As people on mission, we have a love for missional living and yet we see a gap in most believer's understanding of missions. As the North American Church, our focus has become short-term missions driven. While we've facilitated many of these experiences, and see that there's place for short-term trips, if this is a believer's sole encounter with missions it leaves much lacking.

We believe that we are all entrusted with a mission, and we are all commissioned to bring the peace of God to the places where we live. We believe that you are called to where you've been planted, not to the exclusion of other places, but as change agents right where you are. As we all find our place in this mission of restoring the Peace of God to the cities where we dwell, we will change our cities and nations. Short-term missions can be a catalyst into this roll of city transformation; but without tools to help connect dots, often short-term missions exist as the purpose, rather than a launching point. We hope this tool will serve as a launching point for you into city transformation.

This tool was designed with a foundational reading on Peace, and 4 group exercises. This can be used in a small group setting, a staff team building setting or as a tool to foster inter-denominational collaboration. The dynamic nature of this tool requires groups to come together around intentional discussion and then provides interactive opportunities to walk that out.

Our prayer for you is that as you work through these pages and exercises that you would catch a vision for what God is already at work doing, right in the places where He's planted you. As we lean into this moment to foster relationships for the good of the city, our prayer for you is that you would have eyes to see what God is doing in the city where you are planted and that you would be a catalyst for Shalom, a peacebringer to your city!

Envisioning and Strategy Tool | For Facilitators and Leaders

A few things to get started

- This training is built on our 4 core values at SOS: See, Engage, Belong & Build. In each of the training sessions you will learn a little more about one of these core value.
- There are 4 sessions to be completed with the same group of people. We recommend groups no larger than 25-30 so that everyone can participate in conversation. You will need a main leader/facilitator to lead the discussion. Each session will also include breakout groups where you will divide your larger group into groupings of 4-6 people to facilitate hands-on applications.
- This tool can be used in a couple of ways. It can be used for groups with a variety of rolls and agendas who are seeking to collaborate, or it can be used in a homogonous group with the goal of creating shared language and objectives.
- This Proprietary Tool created by SOS is available to you in a digital version that includes worksheets, supplements and pdf presentations. Please feel free to print pieces or materials to share with the group for each session as is helpful.
- You are going to be asked to get out and serve together. Session 3 & 4 involve planning ways you can impact your city.

 We recommend having some framework and ideas or locations in mind for this activity so you can help focus and direct the time.

We don't want to just talk about impacting our community, we need to take action.

3 questions to consider

- 1. Who are your participants? (Is it a homogenous team? Is it a group of people from a variety of ministries? Is it a cross-collaborative group?...)
- 2. Who are the individuals? (staff members, volunteers, CEO, hourly workers, life-experience, background....)
- 3. What do we hope to build a vision and strategy around? (Is it a new project, a community event, goals for our city, posture for local outreach? For this to be successful this needs to be an outward facing objective.)





LEADER'S NOTES

SEE

<u>See</u>: There's a principle that you don't see what you aren't looking for. We can get so caught up in our day-to-day life that we miss so many of the things going on right around us. From the foster child at school to the homeless man at the intersection, there are a million ways to engage in the world around us, as a beacon of hope and light, if we take the time to stop and see. In this first session, we want to invite you see what's going on in the communities around you.

At SOS we value seeing what make children at-risk in a community. We'd ask that as you do this exercise that you would take time to ask that question and see what is making children at-risk in your community.

BIG PICTURE

This session is about our God-given purpose and being called to the city in which you live. The goal of this is to help team members see what's going on in the communities around them and have a hands-on understanding of the challenges and needs present in the places you live.

If your team doesn't know one another, consider opening with an icebreaker to help people get to know one another.

THE EXERCISE

In this session, you will do a location-based exercise that can be modified to fit what makes the most sense for your group: neighborhood, city, county, zip code (pin code) or region. We've included the county worksheet but make modifications based on what makes the most regional relevance for your goal and team. We included research points that were meaningful to our team, but your modification of the questions needs to be relevant for your group's work. Some other areas you could consider adding: Single parents, addiction, abuse, trafficking, at-risk children, education...

The goal of the group worksheet is to facilitate conversation around the shared objective of discovering what's going on in your city, helping people "see" what's going on around them. As our team facilitated the county exercise in a group setting, we came prepped for the session with relevant local trafficking statistics. We didn't attempt to hit everything with the group worksheet. We wanted people to progress through it quickly, and some statistics are easier to find than others. After the group fact-finding exercise, we shared further about an area relevant to our group in greater depth, with the goal of connecting our discovery with our work.

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

LEADER'S NOTES

- Encourage the participants to choose one member from each group to share a summary of their group's discussion and vision.
- Invite participants to share their process of discovering their individual role inside their city's vision.

Questions to consider:

- How is caring for our city integral to the movement?
- How can having a city vision drive the surrounding region into action?

PREPARATION

- It'll be helpful to go through the tool before presenting it to the group. With your leadership team, give yourselves time to think deeply about how caring for your city is integral to Kingdom advancement.
- Are ways to motivate neighboring citizens to get involved in city care and sow their efforts into Kingdom transformation?
- Be prepared to create (or come prepped with) a vision statement for this time together.
 - For example: Our City Vision is __(to see our city transformed through an outward expression of the gospel)___, and we hope to address this through __(quality service projects addressing x,y,z and seeing strong discipled leaders released into every sphere of influence)___ inside our region. Or Our City Vision is __(to see our city served with excellence as an outward expression of the transformation that comes through living out the gospel)___, and we hope to address this through __(integrity, honesty and our commitment to giving back)___ inside our region...
- You will revisit this vision statement for future exercises.



BIG PICTURE

What is our God-given purpose?

It's easy for believers to assume that our God-given purpose is solely to focus on saving the lost. While this is an important part of our commission, there are other assignments the Lord has for our lives, including loving our neighbors and therefore our neighborhoods. Some believers are called overseas to foreign mission fields, while many are given the grace to tend and nurture the very mission field they call home. Both callings are invaluable. We might tend to believe that in cities as large as our own, we're too small to make a noticeable difference. However, that's not Kingdom perspective.

As Christ-followers, we are invited to be used as vessels for God's redemptive plan. This isn't just for the people around us,

but for institutions and circumstances inside our own city. God intends for us to bring shalom peace in the places we're planted. Shalom in the Bible is used to talk about peace, but the fullness of its definition encapsulates wholeness, perfection, and utter completion. Nothing is missing when a person/place/region experiences the shalom of heaven.

Therefore, as missional people, unless we're directed elsewhere, we are meant to look at the cities we live in as the fields were called to. We are called to look fully at our city - not just focusing on the parts that feel accessible or easy. Through our interactions and engagements with our neighborhoods and city, we are meant to partner with God to bring transformation and release Kingdom shalom wherever we go.

What do you notice about these photos?

Is there anything that surprises you?

Is there anything you would want to see changed?

How can you help bring change to the issues facing your community?

Poverty and wealth coexist all around us, but many times it goes unnoticed. This dichotomy creates an invitation for us to be people of shalom. There's a principle we've watched at play the world over, and that is, you don't see what you aren't looking for. As we intentionally engage with the world around us and embark on this journey together, ask the Lord to give us eyes to see what's going on in our communities. As we adjust our eyes to see, may we have the wisdom to know where and how to engage in what the Lord is doing to bring the Peace of God to the cities that we live in.

WHY CARE ABOUT YOUR CITY

This exercise will help participants understand why they are called to care for their city and how being kingdom-minded is an invitation for us to be agents of change. You will utilize the county exercise worksheet as well as the information about creating a vision for your time together to complete this exercise.

If we can identify God's plan for our city, then we will be able to understand our unique purpose inside this plan and take ownership of the role that is waiting for us.

Instructions:

There are no wrong answers when it comes to casting vision. Rather the goal is to understand how we - as residents of this city and believers in Christ - are called to engage with the city we're planted in and take ownership of bringing heaven down.

- Your city will be divided into smaller regions (we provide a county worksheet, but you can modify accordingly.) Teams of 3-5 members from your group will take ownership of specific regions and focus their attention and efforts in those designated areas.
- Each participant is to think through the questions, answering the best they can. For the sake of time, we gave 15 minutes to complete the worksheet to the best of their ability. Some will be easy to find numbers for, others will be hard, that's okay. The point is to start seeing what's going on in each region.
- After the 15 minutes is up, the groups will come back together.
 One member from each group will be nominated to summarize their group's thoughts and findings.
- After everyone has presented be prepared to discuss if anything was surprising or stood out to them. Feel free to add relevant stats and lead a discussion that is engaging to the group.





CRAFT YOUR GROUP'S VISION STATEMENT

Looking at the needs in your city and the diverse makeup of individuals and skills within your group, what do you hope to accomplish together in your city? Make sure that your vision is broad enough that it can cover projects as well as 1-2 years of being "atwork" in your city. Here are a few examples of a possible vision statement:

- For example, a church might use: Our City Vision is __(to see our city transformed through an outward expression of the gospel)___, and we hope to address this through __(quality service projects addressing x,y,z and seeing strong discipled leaders released into every sphere of influence)___ inside our region.





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LEADER'S NOTES

ENGAGE

There's something powerful about choosing to not only see a problem, but also choosing to engage as part of the solution to that problem. At SOS, we recognize that awareness without action leads to inoculation, and we don't want to be immune to the major concerns and problems of our city. We want our awareness to lead us to action because we believe that Christ in us is hope and when we choose to engage in our cities, we get to be part of bringing hope and peace to a hurting world. In this session we will engage with the Gospel, seeking to be transformed by the Gospel in a way that overflows into the cities around us.

BIG PICTURE

This session presents something called The Five Chapter Gospel contextualize and explains how our understanding of these five components of the gospel leads us to actively seek the renewal of our city. This session we will talk about Shalom and God's plan and provision for peace for our families and our cities.

Awareness + Action = Change

THE EXERCISE

In this session, you will walk your group through an exercise where they do a short, personal reflection on the Gospel, followed by a group discussion. This is a thought-provoking exercise, but the effectiveness of this exercise is going to be dependent on the leader tying it back to why we need to care about our city. Make the connection from the 5-chapter contextualization back into action in our city.

After the small group discussion bring the groups back together and briefly discuss the following questions, which can also be found on the last page of the "Biblical Foundations for Transformation," handout.

- 1. Are there 2-3 areas of systemic brokenness that you recognize in your city and feel that your church or team are called to engage in?
- 2. In what ways is God already at work in your city?
- 3. What are 2-3 ways you can meet needs in your community?
- 4. How can you be a part of creating and cultivating neighborhood shalom?

This Session includes the Biblical Foundations for Transformation handout to read. We'd recommend sending it out ahead of the session as a "pre-read" as it contains foundational thoughts for the session.





LEADERS NOTES

- Encourage participants to be open and vulnerable while sharing their personal response with their small group.
- Questions to consider:
 - How does the Five Chapter Gospel affect your personal views on life?
 - How can knowing where you fit inside God's big plan help you engage in the region?
 - How can we as a team integrate the Five Chapter Gospel into our team meetings, region activities and surrounding community?

PREPARATION

- As a leadership team, have a discussion around the Five Chapter Gospel before leading this exercise and decide how you can incorporate all five aspects into your leadership, efforts and projects for your region/city.
- Share how the Five Chapter Gospel has impacted your personal wardying ward your still with the top branks ership with God's plan.

Creation helps us realize- That our city was part of Gods' creative design, in every aspect of our city.

Fall reminds us that- Though the above things were meant for good, sin corrupted them leading to chaos and conflict.

Redemption reminds us that -Jesus, through his death and resurrection, has broken the chain of corruption, chaos and conflict in our cities.

Renewal reminds us that as children of God, He is inviting us to be agents of His renewal in all spheres of the city- be it the marketplace, family, art and culture, neighborhood -all spheres of life.

Restoration- Ultimately, we'll see and experience the perfect city in the new creation where Jesus will be the king and there will be Peace.}



BIG PICTURE

The Five Chapter Gospel Contextualised:

CHAPTER 1 - CREATION: God, a God of shalom peace, creates Adam and Eve, giving them the task to fill the earth and subdue creation; cultivating what was created in Eden everywhere they went. The world was meant to be a place of peace and prosperity.

CHAPTER 2 - FALL: Through an act of disobedience, humankind brought corruption into the story. For centuries now, cycles of violence, sin, manipulation and corruption still reign rampant around the world.

CHAPTER 3 - REDEMPTION: The coming of Jesus as the "Prince of Peace" created the beginnings of a world in which there would be "no end to Shalom" (Isaiah 9:5-6). He comes as the redeemer of people's hearts, bringing hope, rest, salvation and joy. He is the only Way to being right with God; the road to redemptive life.

CHAPTER 4 - RENEWAL: Jesus's death on the cross reconciled all of creation to Himself. Regardless of who you are - your background, lifestyle, sins or shortcomings - nothing is able to separate you from the gift of life available through Jesus Christ. All things in heaven and on earth have the same opportunity available for them. Jesus's sacrifice made all things new through His death on the cross.

CHAPTER 5 - RESTORATION: The new city of peace shall be on this earth, complete and whole. There will be a full restoration of all things made perfect in God.



BIG PICTURE

Creation, Fall and Redemption help us realise, and; while Renewal and Restoration points us toand

Why is this Tool Valuable?

The Five Chapter Gospel presents us with a full picture of the gospel and therefore a deeper understanding of God's heart for His people. These five chapters provide a broader narrative to the gospel focusing not only on our salvation, but also how we should live on this side of eternity. If our gospel is only Creation, Fall and Redemption, then our message is narrowed down to salvation only. This means we miss the purpose behind being a new creation; our commission and purpose - how we play a piece in the global church - all come into play when Renewal becomes part of our gospel message. Without Renewal, there will always be a divide between the secular and

the saved. Restoration then completes the story by pointing to the absolute sovereignty of God and His eternal plan to bring shalom to all humankind; just like it was at Creation.

Note: Remember that the term "Five Chapter Gospel" is just a name we are using to talk about God's overarching redemptive purposes throughout the Bible.

CITY RENEWAL FRAMEWORK

This tool will help participants understand why they are called to care for their city and how being kingdom-minded is an invitation for us to be agents of change.

If we can place ourselves in God's original design and plan, our mission and our actions will be a lot more clear and defined!

There are two parts to this tool - a personal response and a group discussion.

- The personal response: Take some time to think through the questions
 provided on the following page, and respond to them while keeping
 your city and the Five Chapter Gospel in mind.
- The group discussion: Gather in small groups and begin sharing your reflections and personal responses. This is a great time to practice vulnerability and help build trust inside your team.
- Go deep with your answers and discussion. This will help reveal the importance behind your team's involvement in the city and cast vision for the bigger picture.
- Nominate one person from each group to summarize your discussion with the full team.
 - Discuss the questions laid out in the Leader's Notes portion about the Exercise.

End your time together by praying for your city as a group.

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LEADER'S NOTES

BELONG

Belonging is a foundational component of community. As we engage with our communities, we strengthen them to create a sense of belonging and safety (for at-risk children.) Every child matters and everyone has a part to play. Knowing that strong communities bring greater safety, we build relationships and trust through partnering together to build up, and bring peace, to our city.

BIG PICTURE

The goal of this session is to remind the team of your Vision and Goal for your group; to educate the team on the importance of vision as a component of leadership and finally to take that vision and create a project that would help make that vision a reality.

A few tips from a Facilitator, on teaching this session

It is helpful to provide this Harvard Business Review piece on Creating a Shared Vision. Our team had a great discussion around leading out in the community based off this article.



You will need to revisit your team's Vision Statement from session 1.1 and discus creating a shared vision as a large group (this could also be done in your breakout groups if you prefer.)

This was a faster session for us and not as interactive as past sessions. We chose to do a team building exercise at the start of this session. We did this one and it had great tie ins to the conversation.

LEADER'S NOTES

THE EXERCISE

For the First Exercise, you will need to revisit your team's vision statement from session 1.1 and discuss creating a shared vision as a large group. (This could also be done in your breakout groups if you prefer.) The goal for this time is for your team to be able to articulate the shared vision and personalize the vision. What have they been a part of/seen/experienced that lines up with the vision of the group? Are there any projects they've worked on personally that have been meaningful?

The second exercise should be done in your breakout groups. They will design a high-impact service project putting feet to your city vision. When you all come back together, we recommend that you take a vote and you go out together and serve. If the projects you come up with are too elaborate for your time that's okay, pick a simple serving opportunity. The goal is to <u>understand the vision and how to mobilize it</u>.

Please note it is so important to get out and serve together.

To just talk and learn about reaching the city without leaving the four walls of your building is to miss out on the fun of community transformation.

Get out there and serve together!



BIG PICTURE

Why is this Tool Valuable?

A vision is a futuristic mental image or statement that describes a potential believed achievable. It should hint at core values, purpose, mission, and/or strategy.

The Bible mentions several instances where people have detailed and prophetic visions that conveyed information about future events. The visions of Ezekiel, Daniel, Paul, and John were all important guides for the prophets of Biblical times. A vision statement creates focus on the mission ahead.

It streamlines effort towards the end goal and keeps participants on track despite any obstacles that may arise. As leaders, envisioning an achievable goal will help in leading with purpose, passion, and motivation.

Getting to the heart of a shared vision will require understanding the "Why" behind each individual's involvement. This tool is meant to highlight members' "Why" with the hope that similar interests, beliefs, and passions will come forth.

What can our team do to ensure our city's vision is applied inside all our regions and projects?





CREATING A SHARED VISION

This tool is designed to help participants understand the value of vision and why it's necessary to have one.

If we contextualize our city's vision to our assigned regions, it will help us stay connected to the goals we focus on our specific projects.

- Having an understanding of your team's shared vision is crucial as it will direct efforts and projects inside each specific region.
- Keeping the vision alive is just as important as having a vision. Find creative ways to remind your team of your focus and keep your vision fresh in their hearts and minds.
- The team will be divided into groups of 3-5 members. Everyone will have 20 minutes to discuss and record their collective responses to these
- questions:
 - •What is the group's vision?
- •Why is the vision important?
 - •What does success look like inside that vision?
 - •What commitments has the team made to go after the corporate vision (mindset/behaviors)?

Try to find ways to include and value everyone's suggestions while keeping the collective response brief.

One member from each group will be chosen to share their group's response. Your summary statement should be concise and no longer than

2 minutes.



FROM VISION TO ACTION

- 1. Each small group will discuss the following questions and prepare to share their answers with the whole team:
- What would a successful project look like in your region of the city?
- Why would the project be important? (Choose a local problem.)
- 2. As a team, what would your mindset be as you prepare to launch this project? How will your mindset affect whether or not the project is successful?
- 3. What are team behaviors that would optimize efficiency and results in this process?

4. Come back together and share the project your team came up with with the group as a whole.

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LEADER'S NOTES

BUILD

Once you have seen, engaged and belonged now you can enter into the critical work of building. We seek to build our communities, to make them safer places where at-risk children can become secure and be nurtured; where peace is brought to our cities and where community members are working together to transform cities.

BIG PICTURE

In this last session we briefly recap our previous discussions and topics and we lay out a whiteboard exercise that will help facilitate an open-ended discussion. We want to talk about the "how" of city transformation and the goal is that you would walk away with tangible action steps towards building your community as you complete this workbook.

THE EXERCISE

You will need a large whiteboard or flip charts for this exercise.

It is important that you write down what everyone says, the facilitator shouldn't be a "filter." Everyone's thoughts and ideas get included on the white board. While including everyone's thoughts be prepared to guide and refocus the conversation if it gets too far off track.

It is also help if as a leadership team (possibly ahead of time, depending on your group makeup) you come up with some unique missions for the different regions of your city – ones that tie into your group's overall vision. These ideas don't need to be concrete plans but keep them as suggestions and strategies that your team could build on and use as guides in their future projects.



BIG PICTURE

We've been on a mission together, to help envision and build strategy for the last 3 sessions. During that time we've looked at:

- We are called to the city where we are planted.
- We are called to care for our cities.
- We are called to be part of bringing Shalom to our cities as we walk out the 5 Chapter Gospel Contextualization: Creation, Fall, Redemption, Renewal and Restoration.
- We are called to lead out in our city with purpose, passion and motivation as part of a shared vision for our communities.

How can we ensure that as a group, we're always connected to our singular mission for the city?

If the vision is an inspirational driver towards a successful end, the mission is the pathway one takes to see the vision come to pass. A mission reflects something aspirational; it inspires and invites others to get involved, while practically showing how the transformation will take place. Missions break the vision down to bite-size pieces and instill a greater sense of purpose in every effort made.

As followers of Jesus, we are given one of the greatest missions in the world - to go and make disciples. That mission works towards the vision of seeing every human reconciled with God.

This tool is meant to bring out discussion around the "How" of city transformation and decisions regarding what practical steps would look like.





WORKING A MISSION

Working on smaller missions that complement the city's overall mission will help participants recognize the shared purpose between them. This can create feelings of connection and unity despite the possibility of working on separate projects.

- Having a declared mission is what drives the efforts a group makes towards a shared goal. Even though a team might use the same language, it doesn't mean that their hearts or values are the same. Being able to articulate in our own words what the mission is will help ensure that all the members of the team are on the same page.
- As Individuals we wear many hats, personal, church, civic, professional....In our commitment to building and reaching our cities we must be intentional in all these areas. Our apporach may change based on our role or season, and you won't push in all four areas in every season, but its important to take an assessment of where you are at in each season and the ways you are called to intentionally seek the Peace of your city in this season. As you go through this exercise on the following page take time to reflect on the season you are in and how you are planted in your community.

WHITEBOARD EXERCISE

Questions to pose to the group and whiteboard/bullet point the responses given:

- What would you like your team to be known for?
- What do you hope your team accomplishes in the next 1-2 years?
- What are the most impactful and bold goals your team could have for your city in the next 1-2 years?
- How do you turn these things on the whiteboard into actual outcomes?
- Brainstorm on how we connect the dots between who we want to be in the city and our city vision and putting it into action.
 - Example: Serving opportunities, programs, projects, trainings, networking... what does this look like for your team and how can you connect dots between who you want to be in the city and how you are growing as a team?
- Create a few action steps for your team to move forward on. For example, you could:
 - Create training resources at a certain frequency to help educate on an area of impact and couple it with a serving opportunity.
 - Periodically host an educate + serve event to mobilize people.
 - Pick a community event and work to rally cross-denomination, crossorganization participation with the goal of benefitting someone in the community.
